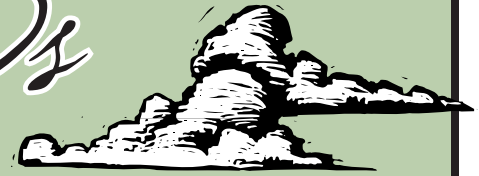

# District Welcomes New Staffers



With the recent hiring of an Assistant General Manager and Finance Officer, the District's Administrative Department is finally operating at full tilt. **Tammy Rudock**, former Public Works Director for the City of Coalinga, has joined the CCSD as Assistant General Manager. She was responsible for managing many of Coalinga's public services including water and sewer systems, airport facilities, buildings and grounds maintenance. She brings a wealth of experience to a position that was newly created earlier this year to handle a broad range of administrative, human resources, and financial planning functions for the District. Tammy reports directly to General Manager Vern Hamilton and will work closely with him on a number of key projects.

**Patrick Bradley** was recently re-hired as Finance Officer, reporting to Tammy Rudock. He had worked for the District from 1988 to 1998, initially as Accounting Supervisor then Finance Officer. His lengthy history with the District and strong budget, finance and accounting skills will be important assets to the CCSD.

# Cambria Water #1

Cambria received top honors for water quality in an informal taste test conducted in August by The Tribune newspaper. Water from five communities in San Luis Obispo County was tested for clarity, odor and taste by four local judges, including CCSD Board Director Don Villeneuve. On a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, individual scores were totaled for a maximum of 40 points.

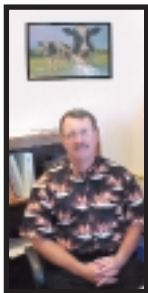

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# GM's Message



The biggest challenge facing the Cambria Community Services District is to identify and implement a solution to the community's water shortage. District Engineer Bob Gresens and other CCSD staff have been working diligently on a comprehensive water master plan to address this challenge. We intend to present it to the Board of Directors and the community in early 2003.

While this process moves forward, Cambria struggles daily with the impacts of severe water restrictions and other considerations that determine the limits of human activity on our fragile environment. Issues such as the level of police, fire, recreation and other services must be analyzed carefully.

The CCSD does not have discretionary land use authority. We are not empowered to regulate growth or issue building permits. The CCSD IS responsible for managing and preserving Cambria's water supply and safely returning the wastewater back to the environment. To gain control over the town's scarce water supplies, the CCSD Board declared a water service moratorium last November.

With oversight from the California Coastal Commission, the County of San Luis Obispo determines how much growth or human activity can be sustained in Cambria. The North Coast Area Plan, currently being updated, governs these crucial issues. The CCSD will assist the County and Coastal Commission in completing this project as it relates to the services we are empowered to deliver.

The CCSD continues to move forward in identifying and implementing a water supply augmentation alternative for the community. How that resource fits into the larger puzzle is yet to be determined. We will continue to regularly inform you about developments on these important issues that affect your quality of life in Cambria.

## Clarifying Recent Rate Increase

Effective September 1, 2002, the District raised residential and commercial water and wastewater rates by 5.5%. Two additional 5.5% rate increases will go into effect in January 2003 and in July 2003 for a cumulative total increase of 17.5%. The District has not raised rates in almost a decade compared to an average 35% rate increase throughout the State during the same time frame.

Revenues from water and wastewater services are used to cover operating costs and capital expenditures for infrastructure projects. In the past ten years, the District's operating costs have risen close to 5% each year. Capital needs have also increased significantly due to more stringent regulatory requirements and aging of utility systems. With no rate increases, revenues have not kept pace with expenses. The rate increase is an important step in maintaining the quality of the District's water and wastewater systems and its long-term financial health.

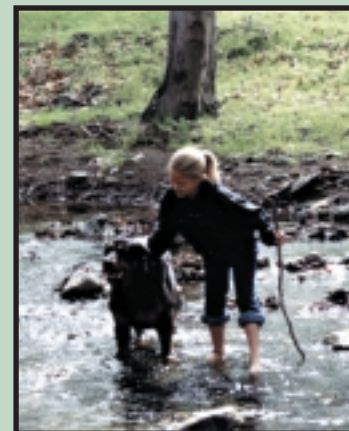

### WATER CONSERVATION SURCHARGE

Drought conditions have persisted across the country this year, and Cambria is certainly no exception. Concerned about lack of rainfall and dwindling water levels in San Simeon and Santa Rosa Creeks, the CCSD

Board of Directors approved a water conservation surcharge, also effective September 1, 2002. This fee is directed at individuals and businesses using excessive amounts of water and wastewater services.

Two-thirds of the District's residential customers are excellent water conservationists, using less than 12 units of water per bi-monthly billing period. The surcharge was designed to motivate heavy water users to improve their water conservation measures, NOT to penalize the majority of water-thrifty customers. The surcharge ends on December 31, 2002.

**\* SURCHARGE RATES**

**RESIDENTIAL SURCHARGES:**

0-12 units . . . . . No surcharge

13-20 units . . . . . \$5 per unit

21-30 units . . . . . \$10 per unit

31 + units . . . . . \$20 per unit

# Water Conservation

## MORE ON RETROFITS

The District continues to offer \$150 rebates on installation of Energy Star washing machines and 1.0 gallon-per-flush toilets. A \$100 rebate is offered on 1.5 gallon-per-flush toilets. Following are key guidelines governing the retrofit rebate program:

- Only one rebate per service address per type of fixture will be allowed in any five-year period.
- Washing machine locations will be tracked if applicants move from one address to another within the District.
- Only new fixtures purchased after 1/24/02 are eligible for rebate.
- Original purchase receipts must be provided to CCSD for copying.
- Toilet retrofits must be pre-inspected to verify size and number of toilets to be replaced, and final-inspected after installation.
- Toilets for retrofit due to home resale do not qualify for rebates.
- Applicant is responsible for timely disposal of removed fixtures.



## WATER-SAVING FIXTURES

A toilet retrofit program has existed in Cambria for many years. Below are additional fixtures and devices you can also adopt to reduce your water usage even further. These are optional on existing structures, but mandatory for new construction and remodels. For more details, call Ben Boer at 927-6239.

**Self-regenerating water softener:** Must be serviced annually and checked regularly for potential leaks.

**Hot Water Recirculating System:** If your home or business was built before 1990, this water-saving system was not incorporated and can reduce your water bill.

**Pressure regulator on incoming water supply:** Set at a maximum of 50 pounds per square inch gage. Locate close to water meter.

**Bathtubs, Jacuzzi & Whirlpool Spas:** Not to exceed 70 gallon capacity. Applies only to units designed to be drained after use.

**Showerheads:** Maximum flow of two gallons per minute at 50 pounds of pressure, equipped with shut-off valve near showerhead.

**Kitchen Faucets:** To be equipped with aerator that allows a maximum flow of 2.0 gallons per minute at 50 pounds of pressure.

**Lavatory Faucets:** To be equipped with an aerator allowing a maximum flow of 0.5 gallons per minute at 50 pounds of pressure.

**NOTE:** ALL WATER-SAVING DEVICES ARE SUBJECT TO FAILURE AND MUST BE CHECKED REGULARLY FOR LEAKS.

## IT PAYS TO GO NATIVE

You can reduce your household's water consumption up to 50% by planting drought-tolerant plants, avoiding or minimizing turf, and by landscaping with rocks, bricks, gravel, wood, and other materials. In most cases, a high water bill is directly related to your landscape irrigation practices. Don't over water and don't water too frequently. If you have grass, step on it and if it rebounds, wait another day to water. Group plants with similar watering needs together.

### Before planting, check out these 7 design basics:

**1. Planning and design.** Taking the time to plan your garden for water efficiency and aesthetics is important. Using the services of a professional often saves time and money in the long run.

**2. Turf.** Turf is the thirstiest of all landscape components. Alternatives include drought-tolerant trees, shrubs, boulders, mulched areas, pathways and other materials.

**3. Efficient irrigation.** Many recent innovations in irrigation technology enable slow and selected water application. In selecting an irrigation system, look for words like "low gallonage" or "low application rate." Consider drip systems for shrubs and trees and always locate turf (preferably minimal or non-existent) on a separate valve.

**4. Soil analysis.** The addition of organic matter to the soil before you plant increases water retention and penetration.

**5. Mulching.** Two to three inches of mulch will keep soil cool, enhance water retention and retard weed growth. Mulch can include rocks, wood chips, bark, or shredded wood.

**6. Drought tolerant plants.** There are numerous native and Mediterranean-climate plants that thrive in the Cambria area. Replace high-water, high maintenance plant/lawn areas with drought-resistant shrubs and groundcovers. Group plants according to their water and sun needs.

**7. Ongoing Maintenance.** Seasonal irrigation adjustments and efficiency checks are practices that save water. Organic fertilizers and composting will improve texture and maintain vigorous growth.



# PROS Corner

## PARKS, RECREATION AND OPEN SPACE COMMISSION

### ✦ PARK RFQ IN WORKS

PROS and the CCSD are seeking a qualified park planning and design firm to begin work on a master plan for the Cambria Community Park on the East Ranch. In October, a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was sent to a number of local

park consultant groups. The deadline for response was October 25. The qualifications of those firms responding to the RFQ will be reviewed by a PROS Selection Committee and interviews will be conducted during November. Applicants will be evaluated on related experience, staff qualifications, understanding of project needs, and knowledge of grant funding opportunities. The preliminary planning phase of the project is due for completion in May 2003.

### ✦ EAST-WEST RANCH UPDATE



The Trails Committee, volunteers from North Coast SWAP, and the community have accepted the challenge of performing maintenance on the East-West Ranch for the CCSD.

Tasks recently completed include:

- The Otter Cove Trail behind the Warren Road homes is marked.
- Thistles have been cut along the Gully Trail.
- Pass-throughs (stiles) have been installed on the Bluff Trail at SeaCliff Estates and the former proposed school site.
- Santa Rosa Creek Trail work has begun near the water treatment plant.
- New walkways over wetlands on south entrance of Windsor were built and installed.

### ✦ NEW COMMISSIONER RECRUITMENT

PROS has been recruiting for a new Commissioner to replace Joan Cobin as well as alter-

nate commissioners to fill in when regular members are unavailable. The application deadline closed on October 11, and PROS anticipates making recommendations to the CCSD Board at the November Board meeting.

### ✦ COMMUNITY CENTER SCHEDULE

Since 1987, the Cambria Youth Center has given kids a safe, supervised place to go after school. In June of 2002, the name was officially changed to the Community Center of Cambria to better reflect its offerings to all age groups. **SMOKE DETECTORS**

- Every level of your home should have a hardwired or battery-operated smoke alarm.
- Test your smoke alarms to make sure they work properly, and change the batteries if needed.

**FIRE EXTINGUISHERS**

- Purchase dry chemical fire extinguishers and keep handy in key areas of your home or business.
- Know how to use your fire extinguisher: Pull pin, aim, squeeze handle, and sweep base of flame (PASS).



**FIRE ESCAPE PLAN**

- Develop an emergency exit plan that includes people and animals.
- Every member of your household should know at least two ways to exit every room in your home.

**CHRISTMAS TREES**

- Buy a freshly cut tree and keep the stand full of water at all times. Get rid of it and other items like wreaths when needles begin to fall in large amounts.
- Keep your Christmas tree away from all heat sources.
- Check all decorative lights before placing them on the tree. Discard frayed or damaged lights and cords. Buy only UL-approved lights.
- Never place lighted candles on or near the tree.
- Ensure that family pets cannot topple your tree causing a potential fire hazard.



**FIREPLACES & WOOD STOVES**

- Have your fireplace or wood stove inspected each year for debris and to ensure the flue is unclogged.
- Always use a fireplace screen.
- Don't burn wrapping paper or ribbons in your fireplace.



**DRYER VENTS**

- Clean your dryer vent on a regular basis.
- Dryers are the third most common type of equipment to cause home fires.

**CANDLES AND INCENSE**

- Keep out of reach of children and animals.
- Place in a secure non-combustible holder. Some holders look like glass but are plastic, which burns.
- Never leave unattended.

# Water Drops



## \* WATER MASTER PLAN ON TRACK

The Engineering Department continues to forge ahead in its goal to finish the Water Master Plan by March 2003. District Engineer Bob Gresens has completed mapping work on the land use and build-out phase and an analysis of recycled water distribution systems. Work is currently in progress on an evaluation of long-term water supply

options, including desalination, the Nacimiento Reservoir, and other alternatives. Initial studies indicate that constructing a desal plant could cost significantly less than building a pipeline to deliver water from Lake Nacimiento to Cambria. A final report is anticipated by January. Recommendations emerging from this analysis will determine if a Habitat Conservation Plan is required.



## \* DID YOU KNOW?

A standard washing machine uses 40 gallons of water per load. Shaving with the water running uses 10 gallons of water. A full bathtub uses 50 gallons of water, whereas a 5-minute shower using a 2-gallon-per-minute showerhead uses less than 10 gallons of water.

## \* CAPPS BOOSTS DESAL FUNDING

A House transportation committee recently approved a Lois Capps' sponsored bill that could provide Cambria with \$10.3 million for a desalination plant plus a \$3 million credit against the \$4.4 expenses already incurred by the District. The bill still needs House and Senate approval. If the Water Master Plan, now underway, determines desal to be the best source of water for Cambria, the bill would significantly reduce the District's costs to build a desal facility.

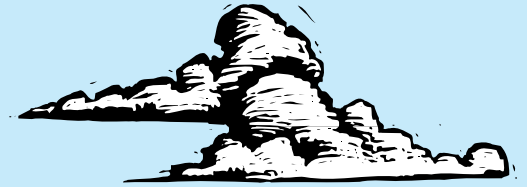

# FAQs

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



Thank you for your patience during the District's transition to a new billing system. In September, you received a newly formatted bill, designed to be easier to read and more convenient to pay. We have made additional improvements to the new bill as shown here. These will appear at the next billing cycle. Below are answers to the most frequently asked questions about our new bill. Also, on Page 2 of the newsletter you will learn why the District raised its rates after 10 years and the rationale for surcharges. If you still have questions, please contact our Customer Service Department at 927-6223.

### \* WHY HAS THE BILLING FORMAT CHANGED?

- Many customers wanted the convenience of a return envelope.
- The larger bill allows us to provide additional information to customers such as the Surcharge rate chart shown here.
- Some customers lost or misplaced the small-format bill.
- Customers also complained about the lack of privacy with no envelope to enclose the bill.
- The old bill was produced on an antiquated computer system requiring an extensive amount of staff time. The District recently converted to a more efficient computer system to reduce unnecessary labor costs.

### \* WHY IS CCSD CHARGING TWICE FOR WATER?

- We are not! The base rate and additional water costs were separated on the new bill. Future statements as shown here will combine the base water charge and additional water costs.

### \* WHY DO I HAVE A NEW ACCOUNT NUMBER?

- Because we recently converted to a more efficient billing program and the account numbering system changed for compatibility with the new program.

### \* WHY ISN'T WATER USAGE HISTORY NOTED ON THE NEW BILL?

- You will receive a comparison of prior billing cycle usage to your current one. Due to cost constraints, we were not able to transfer year-to-date usage figures from the old system. Year-to-date comparisons will appear on your bill beginning in September 2003.

### \* WHEN ARE WATER/WASTEWATER BILLS DUE?

- Bills are mailed on the 12<sup>th</sup> of each bi-monthly billing cycle and are due the 12<sup>th</sup> of the following month.

### \* HOW CAN I PAY MY CCSD BILL?

- You can pay your bill at the CCSD drop box, CCSD lobby at 1316 Tamson Drive, Suite 201, or at the Village Pharmacy, 2306 Main Street. We also accept payments via electronic debit. Call 927-6223 to obtain the necessary forms. No credit cards are accepted at this time.

### \* HOW DO I PAY MY BILL IF I'M ON VACATION?

- If you plan to take a vacation, pay your bill in advance. Use your prior bill as a guideline and round up to the nearest dollar. When you return from vacation, call our Customer Service Department to make sure your payment covered the amount.

### \* DO YOU HAVE A LOW-INCOME PROGRAM?

- Currently, we have substantial low-income provisions for wastewater services only. Call Customer Service at 927-6223 for more details.

## \* TRASH CLEAN-UP, NOVEMBER 4-8



During the week of November 4-8, Mission Country Disposal will haul away excess trash for residential customers within the CCSD service area. Trash must be placed at the curb on your regular pick-up day in 33-gallon standard trash cans or other containers. Tied bundles no more than 75 lbs. or 4 ft. in overall length will also be picked up. Choose any combination of containers and bundles not to exceed a total of 12, i.e.: 3 std. trash cans, 4 misc. containers, 5 tied bundles. Wastewheelers will also be picked up. If you want your non-standard containers left behind, mark or place a note on them.

For bulky items such as appliances, chairs, couches, tires, etc., \$5.00 per item will be charged. **YOU MUST CALL 528-7430 NO LATER THAN FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 1 TO SCHEDULE A BULKY ITEM PICK-UP.** No hazardous materials will be picked up.
